**(100 SERIES)**

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**100 SERIES**

**101 Doctrine of the Scriptures**

A study of the doctrine of scripture: Including revelation, inspiration, canonicity and authority.

**102 Doctrine of God**

A study of God, His nature, attributes, personality, and work.

**103 Doctrine of Jesus Christ**

A study of Jesus Christ: His Person, claims, and work.

**104 Doctrine of the Holy Spirit**

A study of the doctrine of the Holy Spirit: His Person and work.

**105 Doctrine of Man and Sin**

A study of the doctrines of man and sin: Including the depravity of man and the nature and consequences of sin.

**106 Doctrine of Salvation**

A study of the doctrines of our salvation: Faith, regeneration, redemption, and security, et al.

**107 Doctrine of the Church**

What and Why: A study of the origin, organization, leaders, ordinances, and functions of the Christian ecclesia.

**108 Eschatology**

This course provides a survey of the great prophetic themes and events of the future, with emphasis on the sequence of events in the future.

**109 Reformed Theology**

Why the sudden resurgence of the reformed Theology in these closing decades of the twentieth century? Beginning with Augustine, this course follows the Reformed trail through Wycliffe, Hus, Luther, Zwingli, and on to Calvin.

**110 Puritan Theology**

A study of the major doctrines of Puritanism: How they affected the founding and development of the United States.

**111 Contemporary Theology**

An analytical study of 19<sup>th</sup> and 20<sup>th</sup> century theology in its historical context: Including liberalism, fundamentalism, neo-orthodoxy, and contemporary deviationism. Reading requirements will include a survey of recent approaches in contemporary theology.

**112 Dispensationalism**

A comprehensive study of the Biblical interpretation known as dispensationalism, including its history, its application to hermeneutics, soteriology, ecclesiology, and eschatology.

**113 Hermeneutics and Bible Exposition**

This course provides a thorough preparation for the exegesis and exposition of the English Bible. After a survey of the historical schools of hermeneutics, the principles of the Historical Grammatical method of interpretation will be studied.

## **100 SERIES**

### **114 One Hundred Versions of the English Bible--Which One?**

With the proliferation of modern translations, this course will offer a critique of all versions. It will discuss the earliest translations of Wycliffe and Tyndale down to the NIV, the NKJ, et al.

### **115 Blood Covenant**

A comprehensive study of the ancient Semitic rite of blood covenanting: Come to understand why God called Abraham His friend, and why David called Goliath “an uncircumcised Philistine.” This course is essential for anyone who desires to walk in strong faith.

### **116 Advanced Bible Study Methods**

This course addresses various Bible study methods; how to prepare a study library, use various Bible translations, study aids and research materials.

### **117 Alleged Discrepancies in the Bible**

Using the Biblical science of exegesis, theology, archeology and history, this course studies the so-called errors and contradictions of the Old and New Testaments.

## **DEPARTMENT OF APOLOGETICS**

### **(200 SERIES)**

### **201 Overview of the field of Apologetics**

This course is the basic study in the importance and use of Apologetics. The student will learn the principle of defense and the areas of conflict and logic.

### **202 The Charismatic Movement**

This course looks at the theology and experience of the charismatic movement and its effects within the Body of Christ.

### **203 Kingdom of the Cults**

An introduction to the teaching and practices of the Major Cults will be presented.

### **204 The Powers of Darkness**

A study of the satanic methods of this present age: Including witchcraft, demonism, psychic phenomena, astrology, and the church of Satan.

### **205 Demonology, Ufology & Eschatology**

This course attempts to provide a Biblical explanation for the current belief in ufology; how it relates to “The End Times.

### **206 Jewish Culture and Evangelism**

A study of Jewish cultures, teachings, and customs in both ancient and modern times: Emphasizing principles in reaching them with the Gospel of Jesus as Messiah.

**207 Science and the Bible**

The framework is developed for understanding Bible-Science controversies such as evolution versus creation by distinguishing culture as an intermediate concept. The distinctions between science, culture and divine revelation are shown to be useful also in the scientific identification of culture as a source of controversy in Biblical interpretation.

**208 God, Darwin & Dinosaurs**

Explaining Biblical creation in the light of modern Darwinism, and the constant barrage of dinosaur discoveries, this course will trace the flaws of modern Paleontology.

**209 Archaeological Support for Biblical Truth**

This course surveys archaeological discoveries as they bear upon the accuracy of the Old Testament. Does Archaeology prove the Bible to be accurate? Major archaeological discoveries which deal with historical people, places, and events of the Bible will be presented.

**210 Apologetics of Genesis**

This study seeks to respond to some of the major challenges that Christianity faces in the modern world. This course will enable students to apply the framework of apologetics to the book of origins.

**211 An Archeologist takes a historical view of the book of Revelation**

By exegesis, archaeology and history, an examination will be made of the Seven Churches of Asia Minor, and the apocalyptic message of John.

**212 The Religion of Islam**

This course explores the phenomenal proliferation of Islam in today's world... What is the actual teaching found in the Koran? What are the different Islamic sects?

**DEPARTMENT OF OLD TESTAMENT****(300 SERIES)****301 Introduction to the Old Testament**

A summary look at the organization and content of the books: Special attention given to the canon, and problems of authorship, dating, and authenticity.

**302 The Pentateuch**

The course will present the content of the five books of Moses in the light of historical background and theological message. Elements exegesis as related to textual criticisms will be examined.

**303 Genesis**

A study of the book of beginnings: Special foundational emphasis on the first twelve chapters.

**304 Exodus and Leviticus**

A study of Israel's bondage in Egypt: The plagues, the redemption from bondage, the commandments and the tabernacle.

**305 Joshua, Judges, & Ruth**

A study of these key Old Testament books: Providing continual application to the believer in his walk with the Lord.

**306 Samuel & Kings**

A brief look at each of the kings of Israel and Judah, and the lessons and insights we gain from this history.

**307 Studies in the Book of Job**

This course is an overview of Job as well as a chapter by chapter analysis. Outlines are provided, which may serve as a basis for Sunday School lessons, Bible studies, and sermons. Practical answers to the problem of suffering will be considered.

**308 Psalms**

Selected portions of this great devotional book will be studied emphasizing methodology for continued study.

**309 Proverbs and Ecclesiastes**

A study of these books of wisdom: An emphasis on contemporary application.

**310 A Song of Solomon**

A thorough examination of the contents of the Song of Solomon; Including related sections in the New Testament dealing with sex, love and marriage.

**311 The Tabernacle and Its Types**

A study of the design, materials, sacrifices, equipment: Including procedures relating to the Old Testament priesthood, and their relationship to the New Testament.

**312 Isaiah**

An analysis of the book of Isaiah with emphasis placed on the Great Messianic Prophecies in it.

**313 Jeremiah and Ezekiel**

A study of the prophecy found in these books with special emphasis upon its relation to the Babylonian captivity.

**314 Prophecy of Daniel**

A study of the prophecy of this book especially as it relates to the events of the end of time and its relationship to the book of Revelation.

**315 Ezra, Nehemiah, Esther**

This course studies the vision, hope, testing, and struggle of the postexilic generation.

**316 The Minor Prophets**

This course studies the men and messages of these shorter, but no less important prophetic books.

**317 Malachi: God's Unchanging Love**

This course will use the Old Testament book of Malachi as a case study for a five-stage method of Bible study.

**318 Moses v. Pharaoh and the Gods of Egypt**

Using Egyptology and archaeology as a window to the past, we follow Moses out of Egypt in the great Exodus. (Course also touches on Joshua and the assault on Jericho).

## **300 SERIES**

### **319 The Old Testament in the New Testament**

The New Testament writers were influenced by the Old Testament more than any other factor. We cannot do justice to the New Testament doctrines without knowledge of the corresponding portions of the Old Testament.

### **320 God's Covenant Promises**

A course to enable students to think through the Bible as it is linked by the major covenants. Prophetic implications will be considered and practical preaching subjects suggested.

### **321 Mysteries of the Dead Sea Scrolls**

What are the Dead Sea Scrolls and who wrote them? What is their significance in today's world? The greatest archaeological discovery of all time...

## **DEPARTMENT OF NEW TESTAMENT**

### **(400 SERIES)**

### **401 New Testament Introduction**

A study of manuscript evidence, the canon, authorship, dating, and an overall look at the origination and message of the books.

## **400 SERIES**

### **402 Life Of Christ**

A study of the earthly life of Christ from the books of Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John: Includes a comparison of the various accounts.

### **403 The Four Gospels**

A study of Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John based on history, language, archeology, etc.

### **404 Acts**

This will be a study on the New Testament principles of church growth; including applications for church growth today.

### **405 Romans**

A study of the doctrines of salvation developed in this book: The student is provided with essential knowledge of God's salvific plan.

### **406 I & II Corinthians**

The major problems evidenced in these epistles will be analyzed and specific instruction will be given as to how to deal with them.

### **407 Galatians and Ephesians**

A study of the background, messages and problems addressed in these two books.

### **408 Philippians And Colossians**

A study of the background and message of the books of Philippians and Colossians.

### **409 Thessalonians Epistles**

This course studies the practical application of the Second Coming of Christ.

**410 Pastoral Epistles**

An exposition of I and II Timothy and Titus, with special attention to the relevance of the epistles to contemporary Church life.

**411 Hebrews**

The person and work of Jesus Christ and His relationship to the Old Testament system and sacrifices are carefully studied in this course.

**412 James and Jude**

An analysis of James: His development the theme of the characteristics of the faith.

Jude: An epistle concerned with the threat of heretical teaching in the Church.

**413 Petrine Epistles**

This course studies the background and messages of I & II Peter.

**414 Johannine Epistles**

This course analyzes I, II, and III John with emphasis on personal salvation.

**415 Revelations**

The Revelation or “unveiling” or “disclosure” of Jesus Christ is the theme of this great prophetic book. The course will trace the prophetic unity of this concept throughout the book as it is related to the doctrine of last things.

**416 Life of Paul**

A study of the pertinent sections of the Lukan and Pauline writings, systematized to give a detailed and carefully outlined biography of the life and ministry of the Apostle.

**417 A Study in the Beatitudes**

The Beatitudes give us the basis for true happiness. They teach us that happiness is sought indirectly; it is the byproduct of a lifestyle characterized by certain Biblical qualities.

**418 Preaching from the Early Church**

Based on the New Testament the focus is on the great sermons of Peter and Paul. Knowledge of Greek is helpful, but is not a prerequisite.

**419 Introduction to Greek: I & II**

Koine Greek- an essential study for the Bible student. Learn why the Greek language is the key to understanding the great doctrinal treasures of the New Testament.

**420 Egyptology In New Testament Times**

This course provides an astonishing study in New Testament Egyptology, (400 B.C. – 475 A.D). This course evaluates the discovery of the so-called “Gospel of Thomas” and the two little known temples built for Jehovah in Upper and Lower Egypt.

**421 Jerusalem: City of the Canaanites**

This course provides a concise, profound look at the most important city of all time. Explore its people, history and destiny through archaeology, history and the Bible.

**422 Archaeology and ancient New Testament Cities**

The student will journey to the ancient world, by studying the major cities of New Testament times. Discover what historians and archaeologists have uncovered in the cities where Paul, Peter, and Jesus once preached.

**423 Rulers of New Testament Times**

This course adds new insight to the study of the Herods and Caesars; also studied, is Bar-Kokhba and the Second Jewish Revolt as he was proclaimed to be the true Christ of the Sanhedrin.

**424 The Lives of the Twelve Apostles**

This course explores the latest research on the lives of the Twelve Apostles. Discover the dramatic tale of what happened to the men who knew Jesus best.

**425 400 Silent Years: Inter-Testamental Times**

Witness history unfold as we learn how God prepared the world for the coming of Jesus Christ (586 B.C. – 135 A.D.).

**DEPARTMENT OF CHURCH MINISTRIES****(500 SERIES)****501 Principles and Procedures of Expository Preaching**

Learning how to study the scriptures is the key to expository preaching. The student will learn concentrate on learning the principles for the study and preparation of sermons.

**502 The Art of Outlining Sermons**

Students will study the art of developing every type of message a pastor is called upon to prepare including expository sermons, textual sermons, topical sermons, doctrinal sermons, evangelistic sermons.

**503 Bible Study Methods for Church, Home Bible Studies and Christian Schools**

The proliferation of independent Bible study groups apart from the institutional church, requires a knowledge of both the content of the inductive Bible study methodology and the knowledge of how to teach sound Bible study methods for those engaged outside of the primary church setting.

**504 Evangelism and Discipleship Training**

The student will examine the objectives of the local church. Specific training and developing of others in areas of evangelism and discipleship will be discussed.

**505 Spiritual Gifts**

An in-depth study of each passage dealing with spiritual gifts; how they apply to each believer and their practical application to today's church.

**507 How to Start a Church in the Age of Alternative Futures**

Beginning with the spiritual emphasis, the course includes subjects such as demographics, elements of primary consideration, how to locate a place for a meeting, how to finance for property purchase, how to organize and charter a church, constitutions and legal regulations.

**508 Administration and Development of a Church Staff**

The building and training of others to help in the growth pattern of your church is absolutely essential...Including how to find, select, train, and communicate with other staff members.

**509 Legal and Financial Aspects of Churches and Schools**

This course studies the problems affecting churches and Christian schools. It will cover state and federal regulations, school property, transportation, contracts and various forms of liability. Also covered will be principles of private school and church financing for building and expansion.

**510 Public Relations and Church Promotion**

A course designed to examine the principles and techniques of public relations. The study will examine the “publics” related to Christian service, and the “distinctives” between secular and Christian methods of promotion. The course will be project-oriented and practical.

**511 Church-State Relations**

The structuring process of the growing evangelical power in the United States has produced a potential challenge to the secularized system. The reaction has been a proliferation of court cases involving Christian schools, individual Christian freedom, etc.

**512 Principles and Priorities in Church Growth**

This course helps pastors set goals and establish priorities based on Biblical principles. The main topics include: How to plan for church growth; how to take a church through its infancy state; how to make evangelism the primary movement of the people; how to make worship effective; and how to manage time and people.

**513 The Political And Social Impact of Revivals**

This course examines topics like the theology of revivals, the science of revivals, social and political concomitants, etc.; providing an in-depth study of revivalists like Jonathan Edwards, and Charles Finney.

**514 The Evangelistic Invitation**

The spread of the Gospel of Jesus Christ can seldom be effective without an invitation for men to turn to God’s saving grace. Discover the importance, the impact and the place for true evangelism in your invitation.

**515 Ministry in the Urban Community**

What is the role of the church in the spiritual, social and economic conditions in the cities of the United States? Particular attention will be given to the challenges for the church in ministering to the poor and distressed, to communicate with the business and professional community...

**516 The Pastor and Prayer**

This course will be a study of Biblical prayers, with a special emphasis on the prayer-life of Jesus. The pastor’s private and public prayers will be a challenging part of the study. A unique presentation will be how to teach others to pray.

**517 The Effective Pastor**

This course deals with some of the vital ingredients of effectiveness in the ministry. Included will be such topics as understanding oneself, families, time-management, finance, personal goal-setting, techniques of communication and program planning.

**518 Church Problems and How to Solve Them**

Specific areas to be covered include general principles of church problems, handling church lay leadership, staff problems, the dangers of money, sex, power, and supplemental income; how to deserve and get a raise in pay; children and the difficulties they present.

**519 How to Become a Maximum Achiever**

This course deals with the five qualities of the Maximum Achiever and how to experience them in one's own life: maximum motivation, maximum confidence, maximum imagination, maximum relationship with others, maximum personal fulfillment.

**520 Rebuilding the Small Church**

This course will be dealing with needs and challenges of growing the small church into its potential; helping the small church establish its place as a strong effective force in the community.

**521 Practical Solutions to Problems with Church Buildings, New and Old**

This course is arranged to develop the principles of economics, good judgment, good taste, and best efficiency of use of all church buildings: Includes how to transform an ordinary church building into a pleasing, attractive house of God.

**522 Worship: The Forgotten Jewel**

This course explores from scripture the Biblical mandates for contemporary worship; what is worship, how to initiate a worship service and other aspects will be covered.

**523 Understanding the Leadership of the New Testament Church**

The course begins with a careful examination of the Biblical principles for leadership and explores the requirements of this leadership in the demands of the current church growth emphasis.

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**DEPARTMENT OF  
BIBLICAL COUNSELING**

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**(600 SERIES)****601 Introduction to Biblical Counseling**

To prepare the student to evaluate the following conditions in modern society that have created a fragmented social syndrome; the failure of modern secular education to meet current human problems including the failure of humanistic schools of sociology, anthropology, psychology, and psychiatry...

**602 The Pastor As Counselor**

The course will review the unique role of the pastoral counselor as presented in the context of the local parish ministry.

**603 Learning to Counsel Effectively**

The student will learn the procedures of direct Biblical counseling. The emphasis will be upon the use of the Bible in the counseling situation.

**604 Pre-Marital Counseling**

An effective program of pre-marital counseling will be presented. This course is particularly designed for pastors and pastoral candidates.

**605 Marriage and Family Counseling**

A study of what the Bible teaches concerning roles within the family, with direction being given in how to effectively counsel marriage and family problems.

**606 Counseling Depression**

This course will offer the student resources for more effective ministry to hurting people. The Old Testament's weeping prophet Jeremiah will supply the Biblical framework for dealing with grief and personal pain. A variety of counseling insights and materials bring additional depth to the course

**607 Counseling Youth**

The course will begin with reasons for the syndrome effect of confusion, lack of purpose, frustration, guilt, escape, sex problems, drugs, identity problems, the many effects of sin. Techniques of crisis counseling will be studied.

**608 Counseling Adults and Elderly**

This course deals with the period of heavy family responsibilities, the period of maturity, middle-age, physical changes, family changes, vocational changes, changes in relationships. Also preparation for old age, including social isolation, provisional strain...

**609 Counseling Women**

The Biblical role of the single woman, wife and mother will be discussed along with the priorities of the Godly woman. Special emphasis will be given to equip the student for counseling women on the problems of life's various stages.

**610 Counseling Men**

The Biblical role of the single man, husband and father will be discussed. The Biblical position on homosexuality will be examined. Special emphasis will be given to the Biblical view of man's responsibilities for providing leadership in the home.

**611 A Biblical Basis of Divorce and Remarriage**

The purpose of this course is to examine the Biblical texts relating to divorce and remarriage; to comprehend the various positions held by contemporary evangelicals; to explore the theology of marriage as it relates to "putting asunder" and remarriage...

**612 Divine Solutions for Human Problems**

God has a Way: An in-depth study of the nature of man and the biblical principles that answer the seven universal problems that have confronted men of all ages and all cultures. This illustrated course presents a Biblical model for solving life's most basic problems.

## **600 SERIES**

### **613 Helping Christians Handle Guilt**

This course will explore the subject of guilt; what it is, how it develops, and its devastating and diversified manifestations. Discover practical steps that you can take to combat guilt and to be helpful in the lives of others.

### **614 Emotions of the Christian**

Students will recognize and deal with anger, fear, guilt, and anxiety in personal and ministerial experience. The student will better understand the correlation between emotional, physical and spiritual well-being while learning how to experience more joy in life.

### **615 Crisis Counseling**

Current theories and practices in crisis counseling will be explored in-depth. Special emphasis will be placed on spiritual crises such as conversion, unresolved guilt and church based conflicts. Integration of Biblical and current mental health theories will be considered as a part of this course.

### **616 From Rejection to Acceptance**

This course looks at the devastation of rejection and the methods of healing from them to embrace acceptance.

### **617 Fear**

A discussion of the power of fear and the impact it can have on one's life. Exploring the methods of overcoming fear...

## **DEPARTMENT OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION**

### **(700 SERIES)**

### **701 Foundations for Christian Education**

Objectives and goals based on a Biblical philosophy of Christian Education will be analyzed. These goals will be formed after viewing the emphasis of the history of Christian Education in the church.

### **702 Developing Leadership for a Dynamic Church**

This course will give essential steps in understanding proper leadership in Christian Education and ways-and-means to train leaders today.

### **703 Christian Education and Church Growth**

Strategic planning that affects every area of a church's Christian Education program from the Nursery through Senior Adults directed at growth both qualitative and quantitative. Effective administration and structure will be discussed.

### **704 Effective Bible Teaching**

The course will present the Biblical basis for methods of effective Bible teaching. Emphasis will be given to teaching principles that will result in changed lives. The proper use of visual aids will be studied and demonstrated.

**705 Methods and Materials for Sunday School Growth**

All the major publishing houses will be analyzed as to doctrinal issues current today. Practical ways to use professionally produced material will be given with the guidelines to insure proper theological adherence.

**706 Practical Field Work**

This is a specialized program fitted for the student who is personally involved in a Christian Education program of a local church. Guidance will be given so that practical on-the-job training can be more valuable.

**707 Theology of Christian Education**

This course examines the theological and biblical foundations of Christian Education. From this study each student will develop a personal philosophy of ministry that is both biblical and practical.

**708 Developing a Single Adult Ministry**

This course is a study of the characteristics, needs and unique sociological problems confronting single adults of various ages and circumstances.

**709 Biblical Basis of Missions**

Why missions: A study of the meaning of the mission given to the church in both Testaments focusing on the Great Commission. Includes a look at God's plan for Israel and the Church, the implementation of the mission by the Apostles and the early churches; the super-cultural nature of the Gospel.

**710 The Mission of 'The Great Commission'**

How to build a church in today's world: The importance of founding our ministries on principles that will grow a solid church.

**711 Principles and Procedures of Church Growth in Foreign Countries**

A study of the factors which contribute to the planning and growth of churches on the mission fields of the world; focusing on Biblical, theological and cultural concepts, sociological structures, indigenous principles, leadership discipleship and training.

**712 Witnessing to the World's Religions**

A study of current religious movements across the world with basic principles developed which enable a missionary to effectively reach various beliefs (& cultures) for Christ.

**713 The Development of a Multi-Congregational Church**

Usage of building facilities can be greatly expanded when more than one congregation is able to use them. Those cultures living in the States with a language barrier are especially in need of a church that ministers to them. Special attention will be given to the development of a Spanish American and Oriental ministry.

**714 The Pastor's Library**

This course provides an overview of suggested materials for the Pastor's bookshelf, including strategies for a cataloging system.

**(800 SERIES)**

**801 History of Christianity**

This course provides a panoramic survey of the history of the church from the apostolic period to the present. The course is intended to give the student a grasp of significant events, periods and persons of church history.

**802 From Christ to Constantine-**

What exactly happened after the New Testament canon closed? This course covers the ground from Christ to Constantine. It will discuss the major heresies and the battles that led to orthodoxy.

**803 Church Growth in the Early Centuries and Middle Ages**

An analysis: Looks at the growth of the church, 33 – 1300 A.D. as to doctrine, leadership, and methodologies.

**804 Heresies, Past and Present**

This course will compare and contrast the cults which plagued the early Church with the rise of cults in America today.

**805 The Renaissance and Reformation**

A study of the lives and writings of the great reformers and the heritage they have bequeathed to the Church.

**806 Reformed Theologies**

Beginning with Augustine, this course follows the Reformed trail through Wycliffe, Hus, Luther, Zwingli, and on to Calvin...A strong antidote to the superficiality of much modern theology.

**807 Augustine and Augustinianism**

Study the life and times of the Bishop of Hippo; “the richest mind in Christendom.” This course explores how the doctrines of Augustine became a catalyst for the Reformation.

**808 Calvin and Calvinism**

Provides an interesting study of the man and his message: How he transformed Geneva into a model city (for a while) and became a major influence in the Western world.

**809 The Puritan Movement**

This course looks at the ascendancy and decline of Puritanism, with special attention given to its impact upon doctrine, church organization and missions.

**810 Puritan Personalities**

This course will discuss Puritan leaders and their significance for today, including Richard Baxter, John Owen, John Bunyan, Thomas Watson, William Gurnall, John Milton, Samuel Rutherford, etc.

**811 Puritanism and Americanism**

This course studies the impact of the puritans on the religion, education, ideology and politics of the United States.

**812 Growth of the Church in America**

This course looks at the growth and development of the Christian Church in America, and the proliferation of denominations in this land.

## 800 SERIES

### **813 The Evangelical Revivals**

A survey: The evangelical revivals of the 18<sup>th</sup> and 19<sup>th</sup> centuries and their impact upon church growth.

### **814 Pietism, its Roots and Remnants**

Much of modern theology has its origins in this movement. Its diverse developments will be traced from the early beginnings of Pietism to Evangelicalism in America today.

### **815 Christian Classics through the Ages**

This course studies the outstanding literary productions of Christian leaders and writers.

## DEPARTMENT OF COMMUNICATION

### **(900 SERIES)**

### **901 Art of Communication**

The fundamentals of effective communication will be presented, including the elements of ideas, the speaking situation, the speaker and elements of style and delivery. (Course will address communication in the digital age.)

### **902 Powerful Biblical Preaching in the New Era of Communication**

This course will analyze the style, content and forms of proof used by the most effective evangelical and Biblically sound preachers in the world today. The course will anticipate the future impact of the new era of communication, and how to best incorporate these innovations for preaching and teaching.

### **903 Future Christian Mega-Trends and the Impact of Structured Evangelical Power toward the Next Millennium**

This course examines the flow of movements in the twentieth century that have produced primary determinants of contemporary change. The direction of change is plotted on the basis of competition between a growing evangelical power structure and rigorous techno-humanistic futuristic movement.

### **904 English Literature Including Chaucer, Milton, Bunyan, & Shakespeare.**

### **905 Ministry and the Media**

This course provides an intensive study of media techniques, public relation devices, writing and editing, assignments, external and internal publication, and how each relates to our ministries.
